## Our Facebook Facelift


Thanks to Sue Peterson and Jake Liu, our club's Facebook page is getting a facelift! Right now, our page is a work in progress, with new photos and news and features being added as we write. You can access it at [www.facebook.com/GrandRiverBridgeClub](http://www.facebook.com/GrandRiverBridgeClub).

One of the great things about Facebook is the option to set up private groups away from the public. To give GRBC players another way to find partners, Jake Liu has created a Facebook group called PARTNERS. The members of the Partners group will be able to "chat" with each other. If, for example, you are looking for someone to play with you in the open game on Thursday afternoon, you would just post "I am looking for someone to play with me this coming Thursday afternoon". An interested party could then post his or her acceptance.

In order to join the Partners group, there are two or three steps, depending on whether or not you already have a Facebook page.

1. If you don't already belong to Facebook, you must create your own personal Facebook page.
2. Once you are a member of Facebook, you must become Facebook "friends" with one of the following members of the Partners group (Sue Peterson, Malkin Dare, or Jake Liu).
3. Once you are the friend of one of these three people, post a comment to this new person asking him or her to bring you into the Partners group. Once this has been done, you can stop being friends if you want.

As an added incentive to visit our Facebook page, Jake Liu has issued the following challenge. In the bidding, East had overcalled one spade and North/South have ended up in 3 no trump. This was the situation after nine tricks had been played.



I have the lead in the South hand. If I play my cards properly, I can take three more tricks and make my contract. In fact, there are two ways to accomplish this. Can you see them?

What can go wrong?

Against 1NT by North, the opponents led a spade to the ace and the jack of spades back to the queen and king. A third spade was won by the ten, leaving the not-greyed-out cards in the diagram.

Now you can lead the diamond 10, picking up five diamond tricks. When you then play the ace and king of clubs, the queen drops and you can finesse the 9 to get four club tricks. As a result, you make 11 tricks.

Now I am going to change the hand so that West has the 2 of diamonds and East has the 2 of spades. Now when you lead the diamond 10, the West hand has 9652 of diamonds and a stopper in that suit. Since you have lots of entries to the North hand, why not lead a small diamond to the jack the first time? If it wins, you can lead a club to the ace and lead the 10 the next time.

Whether you are bidding, defending, or declaring, "What could go wrong?" should always occupy your thoughts.

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## With a Little Help from a Friend...


Sometimes you just can't figure out where you're going wrong and want to improve your game. A few coaching sessions with an experienced player could be the answer.

Thanks to Debbie Miethig who initiated the practice sessions and outlined the procedure and to Malkin Howes who found some great coaches, we now have nine groups who are involved in coaching sessions (some have finished).

Coaching sessions usually last for four weeks, each session being about two hours. Here's how it works - four players and a coach determine a time when they can play. One of the participants sets up a teaching table, invites the players to the table, and initiates a conference call. The coach can see all four hands; of course, players can only see their own. After the hand has been played, the coach can discuss the hand with players and offer bidding and playing suggestions. It's like having your own personal bridge trainer!

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## Making Declarer's Life Easy

Singleton leads are popular - opening leader is often rewarded with an instant ruff. But there is a danger. When you lead your short suit, you risk helping the other side set up their long suit.

East dealt and opened 1♦, West replied 1♠, East raised to 2♠, and West jumped to 4♠. N/S passed throughout.

North chose to lead the ♦5. Dummy played low and Declarer won South's king with his ace.

When Declarer next led a spade to the ace and a spade back towards his hand, he saw that North had two sure spade tricks.

But the contract was safe. North's singleton diamond lead had given the show away. After the first trick, West could reasonably presume that North had led either the singleton ♦5 or that the ♦5 was the top of a doubleton. In either case, South had the ♦J, and a lead towards the Q10 in West's hand would bring in the whole suit without losing a trick.

This is a case where North should not want a diamond ruff. With four good trumps, he is likely to get his spade tricks either way. He does not need to take the risk of helping Declarer play the diamond suit. If North starts with a more neutral lead like the ♣J, then West will have to tackle diamonds without any hints. Missing KJ54 in the suit, West's best play for no losers is to lead low to the queen, playing South for Kx or Kxx. A first-round finesse of the 10 is against the odds.

Without the diamond lead, Declarer will probably lose two spades, one club, and one diamond. With the diamond lead, North lets him get away with just the three black losers.

 **Don't lead your singleton when you have four trumps.**

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## Learning the Lingo – BLOCKED

What does it mean when we say a suit is “blocked”?

You are in 3NT and dummy tables ♣AK5432. You are happy to count SIX club tricks, until you realize that you hold ♣10987 in your hand. Your high cards mean that once you cash the ♣AK, your ♣109 will take the next two tricks (as long as the opponents’ clubs don’t split 3-0). As a result, you will score only four club tricks unless dummy has an outside entry.

It’s always great to have a 10-card fit with partner. But sometimes the high cards in your hand will “block” the extra winners in dummy.

- Bid and play in tempo. When you hesitate and pass or hesitate before playing a card, you are giving your partner unauthorized information. If you have hesitated because you just spilled your coffee in your lap, let the opponents know.
- Please remember to self alert: it will save a lot of time if your opponents don’t have to stop and ask what your bids mean. Example, if your 1NT response to your partner’s opener is forcing, type in “forcing”.

The fact that these announcements are all repeats means we can do better!
