The Game of Bridge Offers Riveting Contracts and Robust Contacts

Life certainly has its twists and turns. At times, circumstances create unexpected opportunities that can last a lifetime. My formative years were spent in a very modest home in east London, Ontario, where I could look out of kitchen window at the farm fields across the road. It was a 30-minute walk to the closest bus stop to access the Saturday movie matinee in London's downtown. When I was ten, my grandmother, who had health issues, moved in with my family which created an unexpected opportunity for me. My dad and mother both enjoyed the game of bridge and with my grandmother now living in our home, a fourth player was needed. I became that fourth. To increase my math skills, Dad had taught me to play cribbage at age five. He was just as patient teaching me some of the basic conventions of bridge so I could play with them. My grandmother passed away when I was thirteen and after her passing, I did not play bridge consistently until my post-secondary years at the University of Guelph. Too much of my time was spent in the coffee shop in the basement of the Massey Hall Library playing for bus money. Unfortunately, I walked home on a frequent basis.

It was after my retirement in 1999 that new opportunities to play bridge more frequently presented themselves. In addition to one-four table outings in homes or rented facilities, I learned about the Grand River Bridge Club (GRBC) on Gage Street in Kitchener and was invited to join. As the club's popularity grew, more space was needed and the club moved to its present location at 2481 Kingsway Drive, Kitchener.

Associated with the American Contract Bridge League (ACBL), the GRBC now offers a weekly schedule of duplicate bridge games and teaching labs, both onsite and online. Online games were a necessity during COVID-19 and still remain popular. The club currently has a membership of over 200 people, including members from many RTOERO affiliates. It offers a clean, friendly environment for those wishing to play bridge or for those honing their skills to the highest levels. We often hear comments such as "Why would I want to learn bridge?" or "Isn't it hard to learn?" or "I haven't played in decades" and/or "I don't have a partner".

I learned to play bridge socially with my parents and grandmother and that is still my focus today. I have met new friends and enjoyed the social interactions the game provides. At this stage in my life, I do not have to worry about playing for bus money.

The Answer Lady

As the "The Answer Lady" I have been responding to questions from "newer" players over the past several weeks. A request has been made to share those players' questions and my responses in the Alert, essentially a column for the beginner player! You can write to me at suzan2420@yahoo.ca.



The Answer Lady was in the teaching room at GRBC giving a lesson on simple overcalls this week. Several readers had written in seeking guidance on that exact topic. There were 11 keen participants, and the lesson stimulated lots of questions and further discussion. One participant even described these lessons as *cappuccino for the brain*. Included is a photo of the group with this author (who usually takes the photos). Thank you to the one player who kindly agreed to snap the shot and to the group as a whole. So, for those unable to attend Monday's session, here is a brief summary.

Overcalls are any bid by your side after opponents open the bidding: 1♣-1♥ or 1♣-1♠ or 1♣-P-1♦-1♥/1♠ are all examples of simple overcalls (an overcall at the one level).

Overcalls occur frequently and interfere with the opponent's exchange of information. Why overcall? You and your partner may have a fit and be able to play in a part score and sometimes find a game contract. If no fit is available, your partner will know what to lead. As we discovered this morning, overcalls take away the opponents' bidding space and sometimes push them higher into territory where they will not make the contract.

Requirements for an overcall at the one level include: a five-card good suit or a good hand. If your partner is on lead, he is expecting you to be able to take a trick or two. Depending on partnership agreement, a minimum of seven or eight HCPs are needed to make a simple overcall.

The hands shown below are two of the examples used in the lesson to show a simple overcall after opponents open 1♣. An overcall of 1♠ might be bid on the first hand and an overcall of 1♥ on the second hand.

Bean There Done That

Maybe you have an online partner who frantically searches through her purse for the money to buy some BBO dollars. Let's call her Freda Loader. Week after week, Freda comes up with some flimsy excuse for why she can't figure it out. Being the kind and generous person you are, you pay for her BBO entry fee week after week. Finally, Freda's seven-year-old grandson shows her how to add BBO\$ to her account! Freda can transfer BBO dollars from her account into your account. Here's how:

- Sign into BBO;
- Click on the blue "BB\$" button in the upper right corner;
- Click on the "Transfer BB\$"; and
- Fill in the information and click "Transfer".

Life cannot get any simpler. There are three constraints though:

- 1. You need to have BBO\$ in your BBO account or a seven-year-old grandson;
- 2. The maximum transfer amount is 100 BBO\$; and
- 3. You can transfer only once every six months (Wimpy designed their transfer system).

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


Dear David

A Backward Finesse

I was playing in a local sectional team game and came upon a hand that reminded me of this technique that I encountered many years ago. Let's begin with an illustration. You hold AJ9 and dummy holds K82. In order to garner three tricks in this suit, you would normally lead the 9 to the king and then finesse the jack. What if I told you that you knew that the jack would lose to the queen because that opponent had opened 1NT (15-17 HCP) and was known to have the queen since he had showed only 13 HCP in the other three suits? Now you might say: "In that case, I will hope the queen is doubleton and play the ace on the second round." Nay, nay, I say. The NT bidder has shown exactly two cards in one suit and three cards in another, so he cannot hold a doubleton unless his distribution was 2326. What's left to do?



Since you "know" that West has the queen and it is not doubleton, lead the jack! West must play the queen. You win the king and then lead a second spade to the 9, hoping East has the 10. Below is a hand that further illustrates this concept.



East opened 1♥ and NS ended up in 4♠. After West cashed the ace and king of diamonds, he led the ♣J. East won the ace and tried to cash the king. After drawing two rounds of trump, you note that the only honour card you have not yet seen is the ♥Q. East has shown up with ♣AK, ◆Q & ♠Q = 11 HCP. It would be a horrible-looking 1♥ opening bid if he did not have the ♥Q. Since the normal heart finesse is probably doomed to fail, you must lead the ♥J and hope that West has the ♥10.

If you are anything like me, you live for a moment when something so wonderful happens that you will never forget. Remember this one.

- For online games only, log in to the game in question and register yourself on the Partnership Desk tab (or look to see if someone else has already registered there).

If you are looking for a regular partner, contact <u>Joan Slover</u>, our membership lead. Please let her know what sort of game/partner you are interested in – your playing level, your available time slots, F2F and/or online, and any other pertinent information.
